


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HOUSE DRAMA 2024 - "THOSE IN GLASS HOUSES"

First up was Mann-Somerville with The Blame Game. Written by Merryn Pearse and Libby Field, and directed by Merryn, this production impressed us from the start with its strong opening. In fact, as soon as we were handed the professional programme (by Meredith Cloke), we were intrigued. The script had some nice touches of humour, and they had a large cast, with representation from all years. Libby had had to step into a major role only two days before the event, but you'd never have known. Rachel Patterson's performance as a senile great aunt had us all giggling. We particularly admired the sound and lighting, which were done by James Rowland-Hill and Joe Shelton.

Rothschild-Pearce performed next with From the Screen to the Streets. We loved the moral storyline; it was a really good, rounded idea, although the ending was a little weak. Their programme was... interesting, and it worked best if you stood on your head for half of it. But it made us smile. Maddy Bowes and Asa Faux-Bowyer were particularly good, and it was another large cast (many of whom were not credited in the programme). I think it was written by George Hall (though he was not in the programme).

Knight-Heath's play was, like last year, rather on the short side, but it had a good central idea and some well-thought-out teamwork. During their performance, a butterfly suddenly appeared, distracting both the cast and the audience, but they did really well to continue. Cody Flint and Hetty Pullen gave especially strong performances. Ryan Taylor wrote and directed their production.

Thomas-Sharman, who have won for the last two years, were last to perform, and they did not disappoint with their well-constructed offering, I Know You. Their opening set the scene with a touch of intrigue and mystery. The cast seemed to have the edge on timing, with moments of real humour shining through. They varied the action too, with dance and music. Matthew Gough and Apollo Stocker were outstanding, but all the performances were strong!

We deliberated, as usual, over lunch, and came back at 2:15 to announce the winners. At this time, only those who had participated were allowed in, and we were very impressed this year with how each House supported the others. GEOLOGY A-LEVEL at CCGS

The Science and Geography Departments at CCGS have teamed up to deliever an A-Level course in Geology from September 2024. We currently have a keen student body who have had a wonderful time learning to identify rocks, understanding the formation of fossils and how the learning of the early formation of the Solar System can give us big clues about the past. Since September, the students have engaged in a number of practical activities and on Monday 11th November they undertook their first day of fieldwork. On this day, the students went fossil hunting on the Folkestone foreshore, each going home with a goodie bag of various ammonite and bivalve fossils.



The students in Geology have had ample opportunities to turn the theory learnt in the classroom to practice through a variety of practical activities since September. These activities range from being able to correctly use equipment to identify minerals and characteristics in sedimentary rock, to modelling crustal deformation at plate boundaries, along with opportunities to practice their sketching skills.

The Geology A Level is a wonderful opportunity for students who have a keen interest in both Science and Geography. Alejandro says "Geology unlocks the natural world in front of our eyes, connecting it in ways I never could have imagined! Also, it totally rocks!". Sophia & Sophie say "Geology links to other A-Levels well and enhances your wider learning. I enjoy learning it and cannot wait to get to the dinosaur topic!".

Students in Year 11 who may be interested in studying Geology at A Level can obtain further information from Ms Cullen or Mrs Stoner. The grade requirements are 5 grade 6s at GCSE, including one grade 6 in Science. A GCSE in Geography is beneficial but not required.



PSHE at CCGS

This term in PSHE students in Year 7 and 8 have focused on friendship, family, bullying and identity. Year 9 have been considering social media and careers before then going on to study issues relating to racism, discrimination, the Equality Act and the Protected Characteristics which culminated in a written assessment on either the Equality Act and the Protected Characteristics or Racism and Discrimination. Safeguarding, the police and awareness of Act and the Protected Characteristics of Nacism and Discrimination. Saleguarding, the police and awareness of county lines have also been discussed with the Key Stage 3 groups. Year 9 also were given a talk on consent from

the organisation 'Talk Consent' as part of their statutory RSHE provision.

Year 10 and 11 have been following a tutor programme which has included discussions around mental health and well-being, stress management, alcohol and drugs awareness and financial literacy.

The theme of the Year 12 and 13 PSHE provision since the beginning of the academic year has been safeguarding. Students have received a number of talks from the Child Centred Policing team where key messages relating to Financially Motivated Sexual Extortion, staying safe online have been reinforced. Students have also had input from the Child Centred Policing term on drugs and alcohol awareness. The PHSE coordinator and tutor team have delivered key messages on mental health and well-being alongside road safety and the perils of gambling. All of Year 12 were given a talk on consent from 'Talk consent' and key messages with respect to RSHE provisions have been

reinforced with the student body.

MUSIC TOUR TO GERMANY

In July we took 42 students from our Senior Wind Band, Jazz Band and Advanced Vocal ensemble on tour to Germany, where they gave three concerts and visited waterfalls, historical towns and the theme park Europa Park.

It is my great pleasure to congratulate you, Chatham and Clarendon Grammar School, on your brilliant performance of Macbeth as part of Shakespeare Schools Festival this autumn. It was a joy to watch you shine on your performance night, and I'd like to spend some time now highlighting all the aspects of your production that I loved the most.

I loved your fantastic opening, which transported us to the dramatic and eerie heath. The ensemble created some wonderful movement, conjuring up the image of spiked brambles and ancient trees which captured the otherworldliness of the witches' domain. As a company, you developed an effective contrast between this mystical world and the human world. This was particularly powerful when the two elements collided, creating dynamic tension that enthralled your audience.

DOES CCGS HAVE A MICROCLIMATE

In the last week of November and the first week of December, 60 Year 7 students collected weather data from around the school site to investigate whether the school has its own microclimate. The students used a thermometer to collect temperature data and an anemometer to measure wind speed. Once the data was collected, they each set about constructing several graphs and analysing their data to determine whether there was evidence of a microclimate.

On both data collection days, it was proven that the school does, in fact, have a microclimate in comparison to the local area, with temperatures on average more than 3 degrees higher than the surroundings, and wind speeds lower. After analysing data from several different sites, the students concluded that the structure of the building provides a significant amount of shelter from the wind, particularly if it is coming from the West or Northwest. They believe the higher temperatures are caused by a combination of sheltered spaces and heat being given off by the building.

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The students will go on to learn about the impacts of urban microclimates and ways they can be reduced.

THE END OF COAL

The following is an extract from the CCGS Christmas edition of the Lab Report:

We all know coal to be the gift you get from Santa Claus if you've misbehaved. But what is it? And will Santa find a new resource as the world moves away from using coal?

Coal has been a vital means of powering the world for centuries – the first coal mine opened around 3,000 years ago in China. In 2022, eight billion tons of coal was combusted worldwide for electricity, steel plants, and cement works. But it is running out. Coal is a natural resource, forming when plants die and sink to the bottom of the swamp, becoming buried and turning into peat. The pressure and depth heats and compacts the plants, causing them to undergo a process called diagenesis, where they become lignite. Over time, as the lignite is heated and compacted more, it becomes bituminous coal and then the best type of coal, anthracite. Because of what it is made of and how long it takes to form, coal is a fossil fuel and a finite resource.

The stores we have of coal in the world are hugely deplenished, so some governments are looking for other ways to power their country. The United Kingdom very recently closed its last coal plant, situated in Ratcliffe-on-Soar, on the 30th of September 2024, joining 11 other countries such as Iceland and Norway in becoming coal-free. We now aim for clean power by 2030, using only renewables such as wind power, solar power, or even bioenergy. So, when you open your stocking on Christmas day this year, you might find a solar panel or a collection of fresh leaves to power your house in place of some lumps of coal. - **Clove Gater**

Mark, a clinical pharmacist, shared insights into his work in the Democratic Republic of Congo and explained how his GCSE French opened doors for him in this field. He captivated us with stories of the life-changing work he has been involved in across Central Africa.

Médecins Sans Frontières operates worldwide, providing emergency medical aid to those affected by armed conflict, epidemics, natural disasters, and exclusion from healthcare. Their team is not only made up of doctors but also includes professionals in marketing, fundraising, social media, logistics, engineering, and many other fields. Mark emphasised the importance of having a basic knowledge of a foreign language to do this work effectively and to show respect for the people you are working with.


