A level French is delivered by a team of teachers.

#### The course

You will study a wide variety of topics such as changes in French society, political and artistic life in Francophone countries, immigration and the French multicultural society and the occupation and the resistance.

#### The exam

We will do the Edexcel French exams. You will be tested on all 4 skill areas as you were at GCSE. You will also be required to write an essay on the book and the film that you have studies, as well as present an independent research project as part of the speaking exam.

## Why Study French A level?

An A level language complements a whole variety of subjects. You may need languages for all sorts of career destinations – doctors, psychologists and physiotherapists need language skills to communicate effectively with patients whether they work in the UK or overseas; businessmen, bankers and entrepreneurs all need language skills to make deals and sell products on the global market, Politicians, historians, geographers and holiday reps all need language skills to get to know the people and the area that they are passionate about.
